Madrid is Real deal

AS I sat in the dugout waving instructions to Ronaldo and Ramos and Bale, I swear I could hear those 80,000 fans roaring us on... honest.

OK, OK, nobody else could, but it was easy to imagine as I got caught up in the atmosphere and surroundings of the biggest football club in the world — Real Madrid. Sure, Spain's capital city is loaded with culture. There are art museums, historic monuments and squares and churches everywhere. But they weren't top of my list. On a two-day break there was one place I just had to visit — Madrid's Santiago Bernabeu Stadium. Home to the European champions, the undisputed glamour side of Europe (sorry Killie), even if you're only remotely interested in football, the stadium tour is a must-do on a trip there. We had flown into the city on an early-morning flight from Edinburgh and after a

comfortable furniture, an exposed brickwork wall and a comfy king-sized bed. There was also a beautifully tiled bathroom with great walk-in shower. Nothing seemed cramped in, it was a great place to relax. And that seemed to be the theme running through the hotel. The staff were keen to help with any inquiries and always with a smile. As I said, I had the Bernabeu at the top of my list — but it could wait until we got our bearings. The city bus tour, with its old and new routes covers all the main tourist spots and after buying a two-day pass at the hotel, pretty soon we were checking out the history of this great city. After going past a few landmarks, we jumped off near the Mercado de San Miguel. In fact, it's not a place selling only Spain's No1 beer but a busy food market with plenty of stalls offering fresh produce as well as tapas bars stuffed with great food and, of course, San Miguel. The market was reopened in 2009 after a major restoration

and it's worth a visit. From there, we wandered over to the Plaza Mayor, a large impressive square and another tourist hotspot. The Plaza saw a few public executions during the Spanish Inquisition but these days it's an exclusive residential area with a ring of old and traditional shops. A short walk from there is Puerta del Sol, one of the busiest places in Madrid. Surrounded by all the big shop names, it's a large square featured every year on Spanish TV for the New Year celebrations. The Spanish have a tradition of eating a grape for every one of the clock's 12 chimes as it counts down to midnight — so the clock in Puerta del Sol is probably the mostly famous in the country. And with that all ticked off, we decided to stop for lunch. We found a small cafe/restaurant in a back street ten minutes' walk from the hotel and tucked into local wine and delicious toasted bread with a variety of toppings. I'd done a little bit of research before we wandered in and it paid off — the food was

terrific, reasonably priced and served up by a friendly owner who was happy to chat even though it was a busy lunchtime. We were so impressed we went back for an evening meal before we left. We wandered up to the famous Prado Museum, only ten minutes from the hotel and Spain's main art museum, considered one of the best in the world. A good 20-minute walk will also get you to the Plaza Mayor while the magnificent monument to King Alfonso XII in Buen Retiro Parque is even closer. All these places are also on the city bus tour's historic route. But there was only one place I wanted to see on the modern route though — the Bernabeu. You can opt for the guided tour but we felt the 25 euro do-as-you-like deal was the best idea. You start from near the top of the breathtaking stands and work your way down through the stadium to pitchside and the dugouts and on down into the dressing rooms where some of the most expensive players in the world have been. There's a stunning display of those 12 European Cup and Champions League trophies they've won and there's plenty of staff in there about the club's star players, past and present. After all that we were ready for a quick lunch then we headed back to our favourite hotel for a coffee in the ground floor bakery before taking a well-earned siesta. We left Madrid feeling we hadn't quite seen it all but when we return there's only one place for us — Only You. **JIM PATRICK**

AUTUMN DAYS OUT

AUTUMN is such a magical time to get out and about in Scotland as the leaves turn rich red, gold and warm orange in the Perthshire forests, the glens of the Highlands and the coastal trail of Aberdeenshire.

There are lots of events on throughout the country this autumn, including the **ENCHANTED FOREST** at Faskally Wood in Perthshire until October 29. The outdoor sound and light show takes place at Forestry Commission wood near Pitlochry. Tickets cost from £10 (free for children under 3). See enchantedforest.org.uk

Or head to Cowal in Argyll for **COWAL-FEST**, the annual walking and arts festival on October 6-15. The ten-day programme offers various walks, arts and crafts, dancing and music and much more. See cowalfest.org

Or head to Rosemarkie on the Black Isle where you can spot dolphins at Chanry Point as well as indulge in the magic of autumn colours on a walk at Fairy Glen. The walk follows a clear footpath throughout, with steps, and is free of charge. See rspb.org.uk

ABERDEENSHIRE COASTAL TRAIL is brand new for this year and covers 165 miles from St Cyrus Stonehaven, heading north towards Balmedie and Cruden Bay, and then on to Fraserburgh and MacDuff. See visitscotland.com/aberdeenshire

A drive on the B8019 road is ideal for seeing Perthshire in its autumn glory at **QUEEN'S VIEW**. Its location on the north shore of Loch Tummel in Highland Perthshire has everything — lochs, mountains and forests. The view, below, was named after Queen Victoria visited there in 1866 and loved it. Covering 85 miles, the **FIFE COASTAL ROUTE** starts from Kincardine and goes to Newport on Tay. From Fife's famous bridges, passing through historic towns and the picturesque fishing villages of the East Neuk with their distinctive pantiled roofs and unspoilt beaches, the Coastal Tourist Route gives a taste of all that Fife has to offer. Fueled by the autumn rain, the **FALLS OF DOCHART** at Killin in The Trossachs National Park make for a sound and sight spectacular as the water cascades over the rocks and under the bridge. Follow part of the 12-mile route from Killin to Ardtalnaig, along the famous Rob Roy Way, for views over the head of Loch Tay towards the Tarmachan Ridge and Ben Lawers range.
